I spent most of August in school preparing for the year ahead; an empty school is a strange place to be; the buzz and energy that we have when the students are here is missing. That intangible 'thing' that makes working in education so rewarding hides itself away, waiting until the gates open on the first day of the school year to reenter the building.

I have always found it hard to believe how quickly one day goes by in a school, let alone one week, and yet here we are into our second week of the school year settling into the daily routines; our Early Year' children's tears are starting to dry up quicker in the morning and homework is being set; making some students happy and others wish that it is still holiday time.

Reflecting on my first week at school, as all educators should, I realised that I was really impressed by the use of English our students use around the school and the confidence in which they were using it in the classroom to engage with their teachers and peers.

It reminded me of an article I read a few years ago about the benefits of growing up as a bilingual or trilingual child and the advantages a young person has in being able to switch between languages, particularly at a younger age, when they may not know the word in English, but they do know it in their mother tongue and so they simply use that word and carry on the conversation in English.



"A new study reveals that children who can speak more than one language have a learning advantage, with superior problem-solving skills and creative thinking than kids who only know one. According to the researchers from the University of Strathclyde in Scotland, the mental agility needed to switch between languages may develop skills that boost other types of thinking"

The statement above really does highlight the opportunities our students have at our school, where they must learn in English, but also most are fortunate to have at least one other language that they are confident in using as well. Surely this bodes very well for their future, if they continue to learn two or more languages.

If over the next few years, your child is struggling for a word as they do their homework, but they know it in another language, be proud of them as they are demonstrating their enhanced cognitive ability, superior problem solving skills and mental agility.



Mr. Davenport welcomed year 9 back to the school last week and we opened the academic year with our first biology topic; variation & evolution. Students used a variety of skills across the week to research and investigate different types of variation and the factors affecting this. All students demonstrated a great attitude to learning which allowed everyone to be introduced to IGCSE level questioning.

This introduction to IGCSE content one year early gave students an experience to the level they are expected to work at and furthermore, improve their scientific terminology. Within the class investigation, students investigated continuous variation. This relates to variation that can be changed depending the environment.

If you are curious about the investigation please call into our classroom, you might be shocked at the results. Who is the shortest and tallest in year 9? Who has the widest hand span? Does your arm span closely link to your height? The results might surprise you. Consider this investigation amongst your classmates, what type of environmental (continuous) variation do you have in your class?
