Primary

We're coming to the end of another school year. This year really has flown by. The pupils and I have had a very productive year.

In literacy a lot of progress has been made with the pupils. We have been group reading the *War Horse* by Michael Morpurgoin class and there have been huge improvements in their reading of texts as a result. We have also looked at stories from different

cultures focusing on a selection of stories called *One Thousand and One Nights*. Additionally, we covered the topic Explanation Texts.

The Science topics covered in Term 3 were Electricity and Evolution. We designed different types of electrical circuits and created Electrical Saftey Tips that everyone should adhere to. We researched leading scientists, such as Darwin, Mendel and Wallace under the topic, Evolution.

This term we have been doing Geography. We have looked at the topics Biomes and Rainforests. We made our own Mini Eden Projects choosing our own biomes to research about. For the topic, Rainforests, we worked in groups and produced our own 3D continent showing the Rainforest and surrounding landscape.









In Term 3, the Maths' topics covered included challenging topics such as Algebra and Decimals. The pupils have got through some very difficult work and have given themselves a good solid mathematical base for life in Secondary. I have been very impressed with the improvement they have all made in Maths.

I wish all my pupils good luck in Secondary. They are such a wonderful class; I will definitely miss teaching them. Don't forget to enjoy your holidays!


